The 2<sup>nd</sup> marriage of Creed Saunders was to Polly Allen, b. 1816, d. 1852. It appears Polly and their child died the same year Creed and Polly were married which was May 2, 1852. Note: Creed Saunders and his son, George W. Saunders, filed for marriage certificates at the same time. George W. Saunders' wife, Permelia Allen, might be the mother of Creed's 2<sup>nd</sup> wife, Polly Allen. They were listed together.

Elizabeth took care of Douglas Oran Saunders for a time after the death of his father, William Creed Saunders in 1919. Elizabeth and Clarence had a son, James E. Thompson, b. abt 1922. Clarence E. Thompson had a daughter, Sarah May (Thompson) McDaniel, born April 6, 1912, d. July 25, 2005. Sarah sent me a letter in 1996 telling me about my Grandfather, William Creed Saunders, and provided me with names of ancestors which enabled me to find quite a bit of information on my family. She lived in Lane, Kansas at that time.
5. Earl B. Saunders, b. abt. 1884/85. Earl married Mary. They had 3 girls, Emma Joan and Ruth, and a boy who died in infancy and buried in Colorado where Mary

was from.

6. Lurah L. (Saunders) Harmon, b. March 16, 1886, d. February 2, 1962, Cushing, Oklahoma. She married Roy Harmon, b. March 29, 1880, d. January 10, 1951. They had a son who was named Saunders Harmon who died in infancy, a girl, Olga, and a boy, Kenneth Harmon. Lurah and Roy were buried at Fairlawn Cemetery in Cushing, OK. Lurah took care of Lorene Viola Saunders for a time after the death of her father, William Creed Saunders in 1919.

7. William Creed Saunders, (born February 2, 1890, Kaw Co, Missouri?, Kay City, Kay Co, Oklahoma? Arkansas, City, KS? Or Missouri?). “Willie” was a cement mason and did cement work all over the town of Cushing, OK. He died August 14, 1919, Cushing, Oklahoma while repairing a well that had gas fumes at the bottom. He was also sick with the flu at the time – an unnecessary death. He was doing a favor for someone who insisted he repair her well. William Creed Saunders married Cora Effie (Brown) on December 1, 1910, Cushing, OK. Cora Effie (Brown), b. March 15, 1892, Lebanon, MO, d. December 17, 1973, Oklahoma City, OK. She married two more times after the death of our grandfather. She married O. J. Bryan (Orville, I think), and after he died, she married Jimmy Robertson. Jimmy's mother's name was Cora as well, and he had a brother named Jake, I believe. Cora and Jimmy moved to Aurora, Colorado, and after Jimmy died, she lived in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma until her death in 1973. She was very well loved by her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Grandmother Cora was very giving. Her whole body shook when she laughed. She chose to be happy and was a joy to be around. She is buried in Cushing, Oklahoma next to our Grandfather, William Creed Saunders, at Fairlawn Cemetery. I understand that my grandfather was a soft-spoken, hard-working man. I wish that we could have known him.

#### Their Children:

1. Infant Saunders, died January 12, 1912, Cushing, Oklahoma. I believe Infant Saunders is buried next to Cora Effie's father, Robert Samuel Brown, b. September 10, 1858, MO, d. April 10, 1912, of a heart attack in Cushing, OK.. Robert made the burial arrangements, and probably purchased the lots at New Zion Cemetery, Cushing, Oklahoma at that time. I read where there is an unmarked grave near or next to the grave of Robert Samuel Brown. Cora and William must have been heart-broken when their first-born died. Robert Samuel Brown died 3 months after his grandchild died.
2. Thelma Louise (Saunders) Jones, born January 20, 1914, Cushing, Oklahoma, died June 27, 1992, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Thelma married John Henry Jones, born September 9, 1911, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, died November 22, 2008, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. They were married June 19, 1932 in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. There had been

a bad flood in Capital Hill on the south side of Oklahoma City in June, 1932. Cora Effie (Brown) Saunders Bryan and her children, Thelma Louise, Douglas Oran and Lorene Viola Saunders, escaped with the clothes on their back. The story was that Grandmother Cora wanted to go back and get her corset, but they wouldn't let her. Just a day or two later, Thelma and John were to be married. Thelma had to borrow a dress to wear for the wedding, and they were married at the home of Margaret Eckel. She was a beautiful bride and John a handsome groom. John and Thelma had 2 boys and 1 girl, still living as of 2013. Thelma Louise was an accomplished pianist and had a pretty alto voice. Her daughter would get on the organ and her mother the piano and they would play "Winter Wonderland" each Christmas. She was the pianist at Capital Hill Baptist Church for several years before she married. Thelma and John had a long marriage, 60 years and one week, and they were loved. Thelma Louise (Saunders) died of a massive stroke. John Henry Jones, died at the age of 97 in a car accident. He had a "medical event" and caused damage to several cars. Thankfully, no additional lives were lost.

3. Lorene Viola (Saunders) Newell, born December 28, 1917, Cushing, Oklahoma, died April 8, 1999, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. She died as a result of several strokes, I believe. Lorene Saunders married Franklin Pierce Newell, born 1915, died 1987, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Both buried at Chapel Hill Cemetery, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. They had 3 lovely girls, still living as of 2013. My Aunt Lorene was a gracious and loving mother to her children. I remember her talent in drawing babies, etc. She also had a talent for decorating her home. She married her 2<sup>nd</sup> husband, Hugh Cunningham and he died before 1999 and is buried at Chapel Hill Cemetery.
4. Douglas Oran Saunders, born June 19, 1916, Cushing, Oklahoma, died March 13, 1996, Temple, Texas at the VA Hospital. Buried at Roger Cemetery, Rogers, Texas (5 miles out of Tolar). His first marriage was to Vivian Claudia (Clements) and had one son, Ronald Douglas Saunders, born July 28, 1935; died August 11, 2002, New York, New York. Douglas Oran Saunders 2<sup>nd</sup> marriage was to one of my favorite aunts, Juanita Grace Brownlee, born November 21, 1921, died March 23, 2001, Fresno, California. As a child, I thought she was absolutely beautiful. They had a boy and a girl, still living as of 2013 on the west coast. Douglas Oran Saunders 3<sup>rd</sup> marriage was to Easter Marie (Hill), born 1926. They were married May 13, 1966. No children. Douglas Oran Saunders, like his father, died an unnecessary death. He went to the VA Hospital in Temple, Texas for some tests, and they put him on oxygen. The new oxygen tubes had not been flushed out before being purchased by the hospital, and they were toxic. About 11 people lost their lives because of this, one of which

was a much-loved father, uncle and friend to all, Douglas Oran Saunders.  
The nieces and nephews loved his magic tricks.

After Robert Samuel Brown's death in 1912, Emily and her youngest child, Florence Brown, returned to Lebanon, Missouri and Emily married in 1916 Anderson Douglas Griffin, b. August 30, 1854, d. January 25, 1933. After Anderson died, Emily married John Snow. They were married October 6, 1935, Missouri. John Snow died in 1942. Emily married her fourth husband, Harrison Shadrack Jones, on August 8, 1944-March 7, 1952 when Emily died. She is buried at White Oak Pond Cemetery, Lebanon, MO.

Richard Stallings was born 1638 in Lincolnshire, England, died April 9, 1703 in Calvert Co, MD. He married Lavarina Alice Elizabeth Kingland, b. 1644 Dorsett, England, d. 1703 Calvert Co, MD (Lavarina was daughter of Anthony Kinkland and Alice Elizabeth Lavinia Deane). Richard and Lavarina's child: Jacob Stallings, b. 1678, d. 1752.

Robert Albin, born 1620. He married Sarah. Their child(ren): James Albin, b. 1642 Derbyshire, England, d. December 29, 1722 Meath Co, Leinster, Ireland. James Albin married Margaret Yeoman abt. 1663 in Derbyshire, England.

This is our branch of the Saunders Family, their wives, parents and ancestors. This search is never-ending and always interesting and has been one of the most fulfilling things in my life which, of course includes my children, grandchildren and great grandchildren who are still living but not mentioned here for privacy reasons.

## MEETS DEATH IN WELL FROM GAS

This, Thursday forenoon, while working on a well on the George Pounds place, immediately north of the city, William Saunders, a well known local contractor, having gone down into the well, was overcome by gas.

He had placed a charge of dynamite in the bottom of the mine in the bottom which did not explode and had gone down to investigate, when he was overcome. The fire department was called and immediately went to the scene, but those present had already got him out. He, of course, was altogether unconscious.

Chief Newby and Chief Gelbhar with assistance, at once brought him to the hospital, giving first aid.

Physicians were summoned and everything was done but all in vain. While he had breathed a few times, after a few hours he was pronounced dead and the body taken to the Walters Undertaking rooms.

He had been in the well some 15 minutes before any thought of danger occurred, and another 15 minutes was taken to reach him.

The occurrence comes as a shock. Mr. Saunders was yet a young man. He was a great worker, never idle. Quiet and unassuming, he did his bit and was highly respected. He leaves a wife and several small children.

## A NEW CITY HALL

It is very evident that some of Cushing's citizens and officials are thoroughly imbued with the spirit of improvement and that Cushing is going to show up well.

Along with a large number of private enterprises, residences and business blocks, a semi-public one, the new Presbyterian church, and a half hundred blocks of proposed paving, now comes the proposition to build a new city hall and otherwise improve the city hall square. N.B.—We omit the \$150,000.00 water plant now under construction.

Of all these except the water, none are more needed nor a more progressive step which will do good to the city than the city hall. Under the present conditions we can get along without as much of the proposed paving. In fact, some of this paving is very little more than a luxury for the benefit of one class of our citizens. Not all, but some of it. True the paving, all of it, would be a great and good thing for the city and we must have it sooner or later to make a city, but Rome was not built in a day and we have needed some of it worse in the past when it could have been put in under more favorable circumstances, but we need the city hall more badly, both as an evidence of our city's standing and as a utility, and we need it right now and its necessity is greater now than ever.

The present shanty used by the officials is a disgrace and a discredit injuring us in the eyes of the many who come here from abroad. The same can be said of the appearance of the square. If for no other reason than the impression our shanty gives and that a respectable building would give, we need new quarters. But that is not all.

Under present conditions there are valuable records in danger of being lost every day. This, alone, would justify the providing of a new hall.

Mayor Alles has prepared plans and has estimated the cost of building, furniture, vault, automobile truck for the fire department and improving the grounds. The total cost is estimated at \$50,000.00. To erect the building will take about \$28,000.00.

The plan provides for a basement and two stories. In the basement will be the jail and the quarters of the fire department. The first floor will contain the offices for the different officials and police court.

The second floor is arranged for an auditorium with a few smaller offices. The auditorium is a much needed convenience in Cushing. It will be so arranged as to make a fine court room, jury room, and offices for a Superior Court, which Cushing will get one of these days. But we must have the room for it. The lack of this room was the big argument a-

## FORMER PASTOR DIES

The Citizen is in receipt of a letter from W. R. Jones, who was superintendent of the Cushing Public Schools for three years, and later served one term as County Judge of Payne County, conveying the sad news of the death at Oklahoma City, of Rev. J. R. Biard, well known in Cushing and vicinity.

Rev. Biard was pastor of the Christian Church in this city for several years and later on was engaged in the real estate and insurance business here. His health failing, he went to Texas but later returned to Oklahoma and re-entered the ministry. For the past two years or more he has been pastor of the church at Poteau, where he has evidently been doing great work. We give the following account of his work there and his death, taken from the Poteau Weekly Sun.

Tuesday morning word was flashed to Poteau that Rev. J. R. Biard died in a hospital at Oklahoma City that morning at 2:00 o'clock.

For some time past Rev. Biard had been in failing health and on Friday evening of last week he was taken to Oklahoma City by his physician, Dr. John L. Plumlee for an operation for chronic appendicitis, as a last resort, but his depleted constitution could not stand the shock and death resulted.

His son Harold, who holds a position in Oklahoma City was with his father during the operation and on Sunday morning his wife left for his bedside in response to a telegram that his condition was growing worse, and was with him when the end came.

Bro. Biard, as he was familiarly called by everyone, irrespective of creed or religious affiliation, was, we feel safe in saying one of the best liked and most popular men who ever came to Poteau. He came here two years ago as a result of a Christian revival held by Rev. House to organize and build up the Christian church in this community and just how well he has succeeded is attested by the large following of the church to be found here now—one of the liveliest congregations in the city or community.

Aside from his religious activities he was always to the front in every movement for the betterment of the city or community and at the time of his passing was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, in which position he came nearer measuring up to the requirements as an all around man than any one that has heretofore filled the office—in short he was by long odds the best secretary the Chamber of Commerce of Poteau has ever had. He stood high in the ranks, if not the foremost worker the town and the county had in the late war—the most gregarious in all history—and it was never too early or too

a representation of his church, a representation of the soldier boys and several ladies attended from Poteau. Though he has left us, let us say: "He is not dead—he is just away."

His death comes as a shock to his many friends here and genuine sorrow is expressed by all. J. R. Biard was in many respects a remarkable man, bubbling over with energy and enthusiasm and with a heart full of good will for everyone. He always sympathized with the unfortunate and gave a helping hand. He sought for opportunities to help. He was never idle and it is probable that overwork played some part in his taking away. He will be missed by the people among whom he worked.

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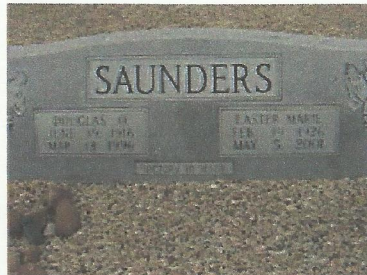
